Domestic economy continues on a weakening trend

 \sim A decline in the manufacturing industry's performance due to the slowdown in exports \sim

(Companies researched: 23,059; Valid responses: 9,619; Response rate: 41.7%; Survey start date: May 2002)

< Overview of December 2018: Weak domestic economy >

The economic diffusion index (DI) in December 2018 was 49.4, down 0.1 point from the previous month, and worsened for the first time in two months. Although there was year-end demand, the manpower shortage accelerated and the domestic economy continued on a weakening trend, such as a decline in the manufacturing industry's performance due to the slowdown in exports, etc.

< Future outlook: Uncertainty has intensified >


While a demand increase due to the hike in the consumption tax and a reactionary decline are expected, there are concerns about the slowdown of external demand in China, etc., and how the US-Japan trade negotiations will progress, so uncertainty has further intensified.

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By industry: A manpower shortage accelerated due to year-end demand being impacted by the slowdown of external demand.

By size: While "SMEs" worsened, "large enterprises" improved for the first time in five months.

By region: All ten regions worsened on a year-on-year comparison. Some regions were also impacted by the warm winter.

Internet-based survey conducted December 14 2018 – January 7 2019

The explanation of the Economic Diffusion Index

Research Purpose/Researched Terms

TDB Economic Trend Research (started from May 2002) is a monthly statistical survey conducted for over 20,000 nationwide corporations on their general business activities including the current condition and future outlook of the industry business performance and operating climate. The primary purpose of such a survey is to assess the current state of Japan's economy.

Selection of the Subject Corporations

Companies of all sizes in all domestic industries are eligible to participate in the survey.

DI Calculation

The DI (Diffusion Index) is calculated by multiplying the number of responses for each assessment category by the number given in parentheses in the table below, to a seven-level assessment rated by companies.

An economic DI of 50 is **the point separating good and bad**, so a DI over 50 means "good," and below 50 means "bad." (The numbers are rounded off to one decimal place.) No weight is given according to a company's size, and calculations are made on the basis of "one company, one vote."
